- A family's income may not be a good indicator of the family's need of resources
- Patients and families appreciate being asked about social issues
- A pediatrician's role is to serve as a connector to refer patients and families to a resource. A pediatric practice must:
 - o Ask the right questions
 - Learn about the community resources availableConnect the patient to the right resource
- Select a "superuser" in your practice who can help identify community resources in the area
- When referring a patient to a community resource:
 Rely on full-service, "no wrong door" community organization that can help with multiple needs
 - o Utilize Lift Up KC (https://liftupkc.org/)

Key Insight: Address social needs by listening, referring, and connecting patients to community resource 'specialists'.

Integration of Behavioral Health Services into Primary Care – Updated Resources to Support Your Practice

- Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death in people age 10-24. Early detection is a critical prevention strategy.
- Behavioral health integration is incorporating mental health care into primary care settings for the purpose of improving the quality of care, reducing stigma, and increasing access.
- Models of integrated behavioral health include:
 - o Coordinated <u>communication</u> is the key element
 - Co-located proximity is the key element
 - o Integrated practice change is the key element
